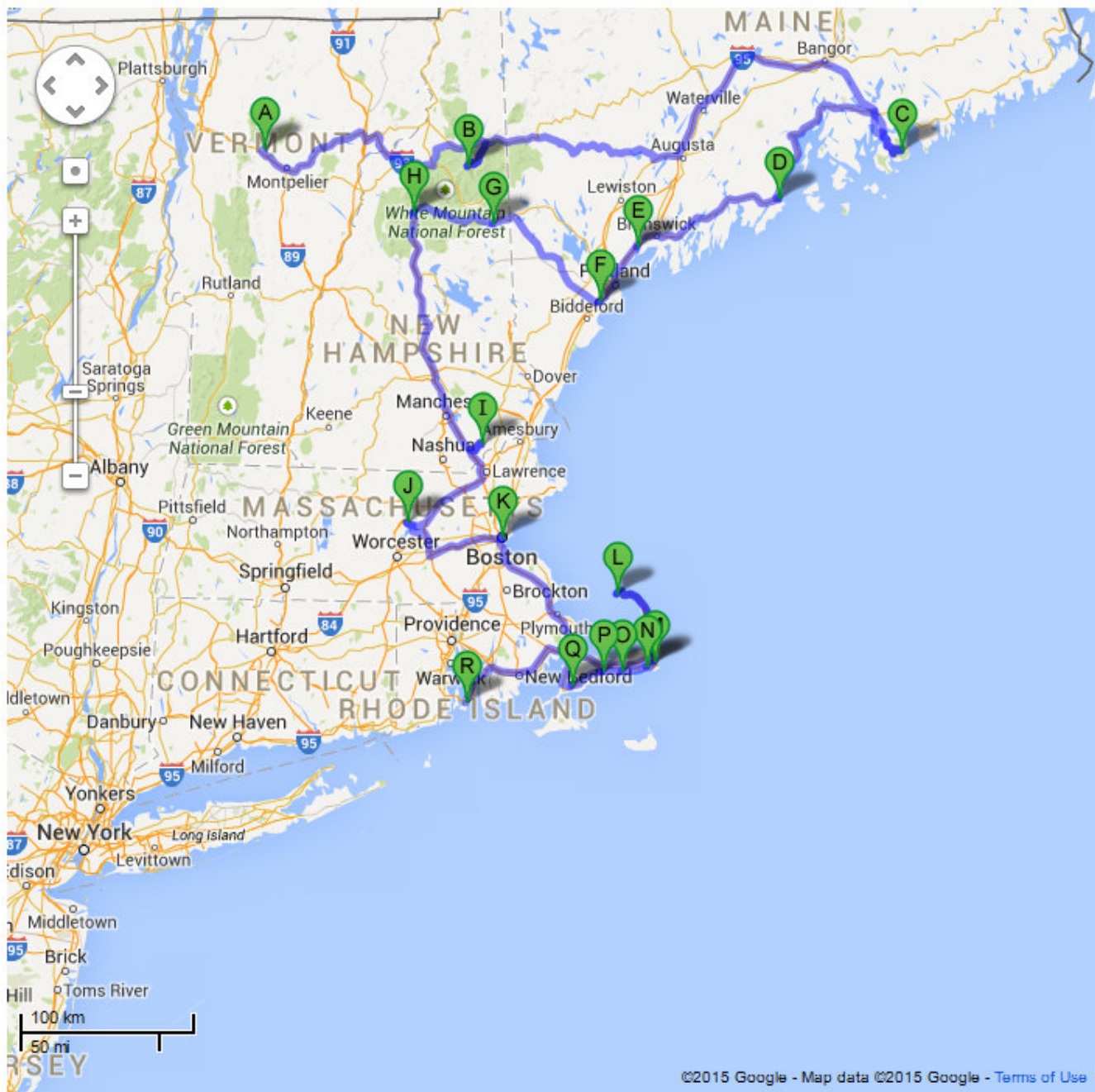

The Mount Washington Auto Road (originally **Mount Washington Carriage Road**) *N 44.289504°, W 71.224926° to N 44.269966°, W 71.303409°, 15 mi, 24 km, 0:43 hrs return* is a 7.6 mi (12.2 km) toll road that extends from New Hampshire Route 16 in Pinkham Notch to the summit of Mount Washington in the White Mountains of the US state of New Hampshire. The road climbs 4,618 ft (1,408 m) from an altitude of 1,527 ft (465 m) at the bottom to 6,145 ft (1,873 m) at the top, an average gradient of 11.6%. The road was completed and opened to the public in 1861.

The first car to drive to the top of New England's Mount Washington Auto Road was the original Stanley Steamer back in 1899, which tells you how deep this road's roots run. Short and steep—climbing nearly 5,000 feet in less than eight miles—it passes dozens of vista points, waterfalls, and alpine meadows before coming to an end at what circus-meister P. T. Barnum called the "2nd Greatest Show on Earth."

Where to Stop: On the far side of the summit, the palatial [Mount Washington Hotel at Bretton Woods](#) is a grand resort with its own coal-fired cog railway climbing back up to the top of the mountain.

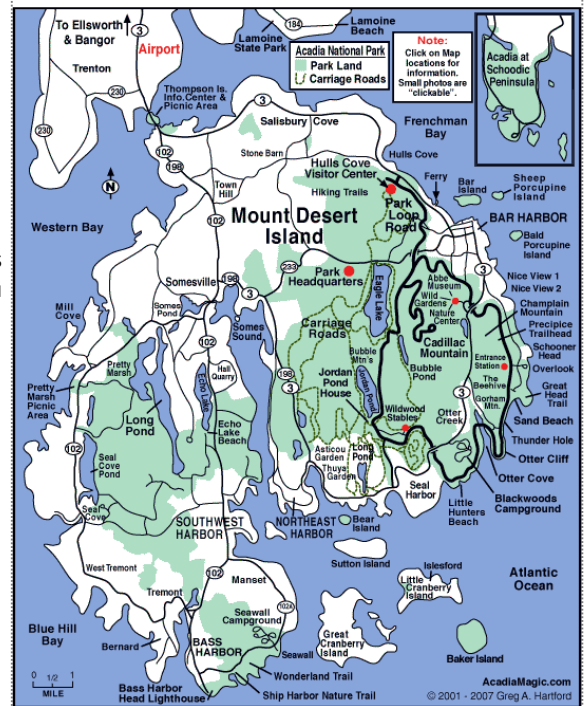

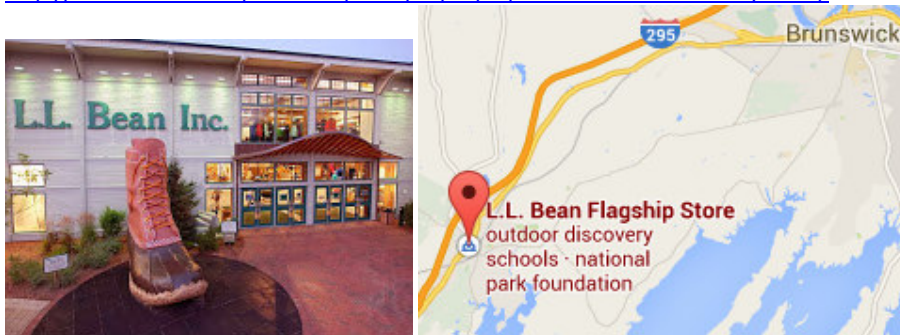
The 27 mile Park Loop Road is the primary avenue for navigating through Acadia National Park on Mount Desert Island by vehicle. It begins near the Hulls Cove Visitor Center on the north side of the island and connects the park's lakes, mountains, forests and rocky shores for easy exploration. You may also access it off Route 3 just south of Bar Harbor on the right just past Jackson Lab. Much of the road is one way but there is a two way section that begins near Wildwood Stables so keep this in mind. (GPS Coordinates for entry points are provided below.) A fee is required and may be paid at the Entrance Station located about one-half mile north of Sand Beach. Entrance Passes may also be purchased at the Visitor Center, Blackwoods and Seawall Campgrounds, the Bar Harbor Village Green, and the Thompson Island Information Center.

Pack your binoculars for this coastal drive that skirts the woodlands of Acadia National Park, a prime spot for spying bald eagles and nesting peregrine. The 27-mile Park Loop Road segment follows the high ridges of Bar Harbor down to Sand Beach and Otter Cliff and loops inland along Jordan Pond. It's the centerpiece of the drive, which starts in Trenton, takes Route 3 south, turns on the Loop Road, then rejoins Route 3.

Where to Stop: Local small towns begin buzzing in late spring. For homemade ice cream and popovers, pull over at the historic Jordan Pond House (open for the season as of May). Then put that energy to work hiking Acadia's Cadillac Mountain, whose 1,532-foot peak overlooks the Atlantic. [Attractions/USA-americas-most-scenic-iconic-roads.doc](#)

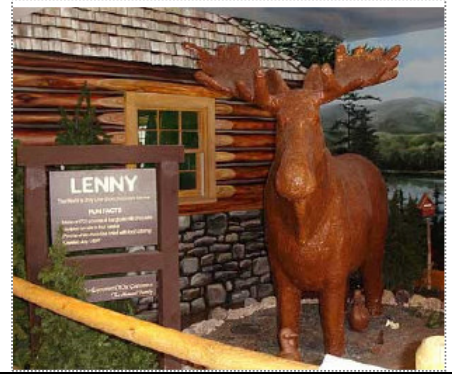

Though the White Mountains are a year-round sportsman's paradise, the autumnal fireworks are the undisputed highlights of New Hampshire's 36-mile Kancamagus Highway. Serious leaf-peepers visit in October to see the maples, alder, and birch blazing in full Technicolor glory. In spring, expect yellow violets and wood anemone.

Stop: Take the half-mile hike to Sabbaday Falls, near Waterville, NH, to visit a three-tiered waterfall with easy access to the road.

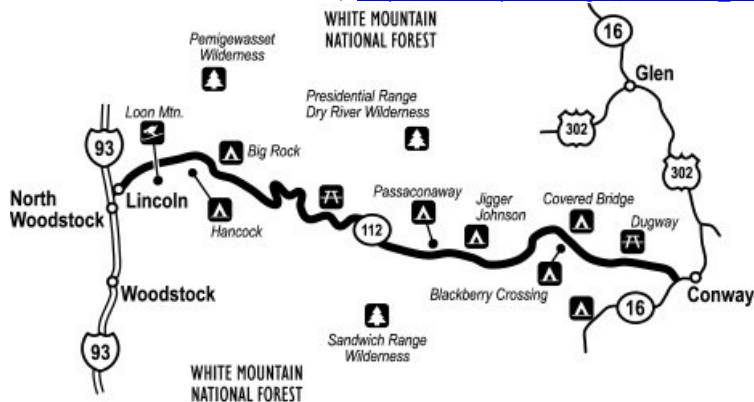
New England has many miles of great drives, but nothing beats "The Kanc"—a 26.5-mile drive along Route 112, between the towns of Conway and Lincoln. Often rated as the best fall color drive in the U.S., this road is a commerce-free climb past colonial farmhouses, scenic covered bridges, and miles of hardwood and evergreen forest.

Where to Stop: Sabbaday Falls. Just east of the crest, and a quick 15-minute stroll south of the highway, the splashing cascades have been a popular picnic spot since frontier times.

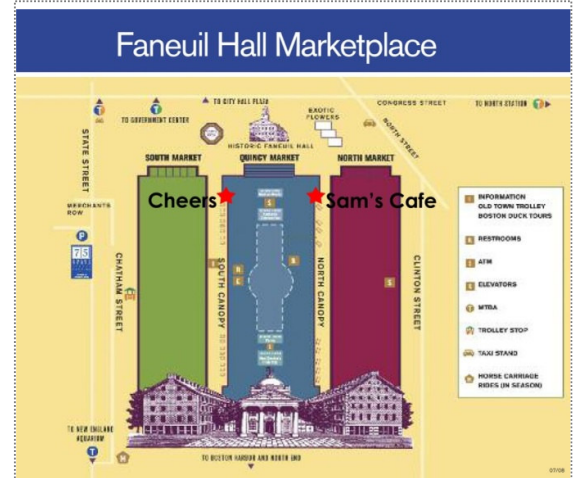

This 117-mile route links Cape Cod's network of sand dunes, beaches, marshes, tidal ponds, and quaint fishing towns. You can follow it to Provincetown's music festivals and art galleries, to the bay side for family-friendly beaches, or ocean-side for panoramas of the Cape Cod National Seashore.

Stop: Book a summertime whale-watching boat tour and keep your eyes peeled for a big-winged New Englander or humpback whale. (whalewatch.com; \$42)

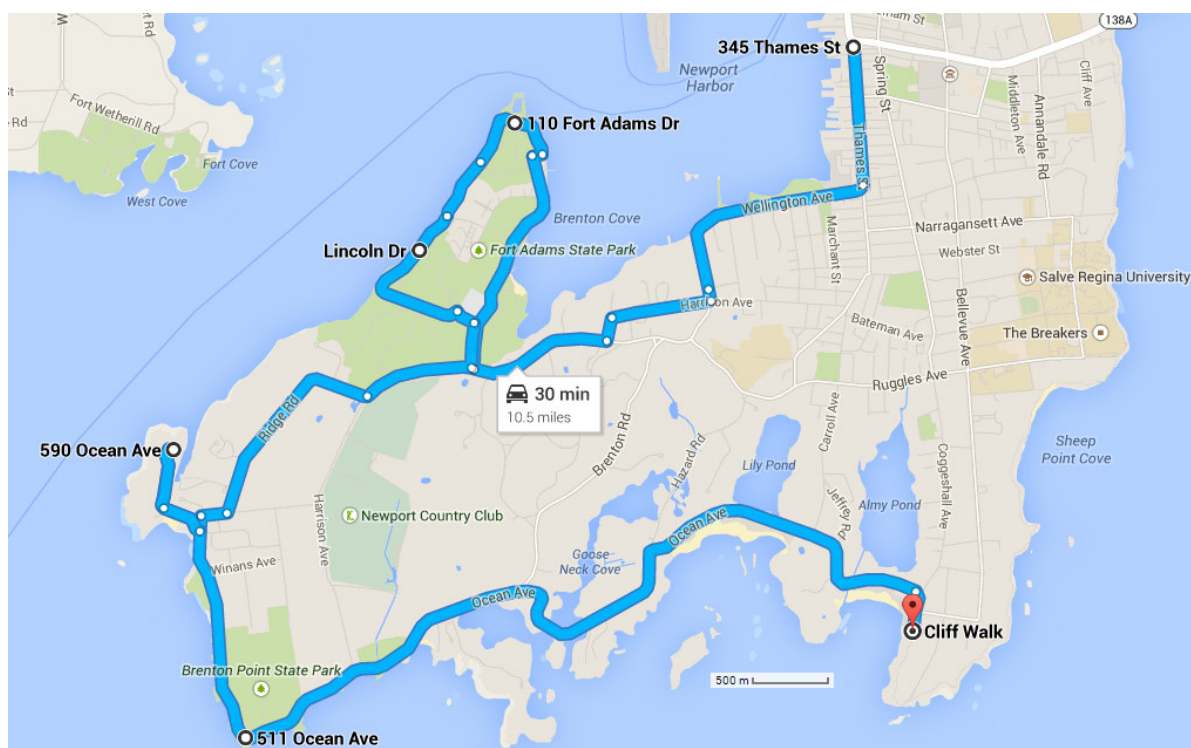

The 10-mile coastal route packs in historic mansions and spectacular views over Narragansett Bay. The Gilded Age “cottages” of Ocean Drive compete with maritime scenery for jaw-dropping splendor, including opulent homes built for titans of *fin de siècle* industry, the Vanderbilts, Astors, and Morgans.

Stop: War buffs can visit historic Fort Adams, which garrisoned soldiers for more than 125 years. (fortadams.org; \$10.)

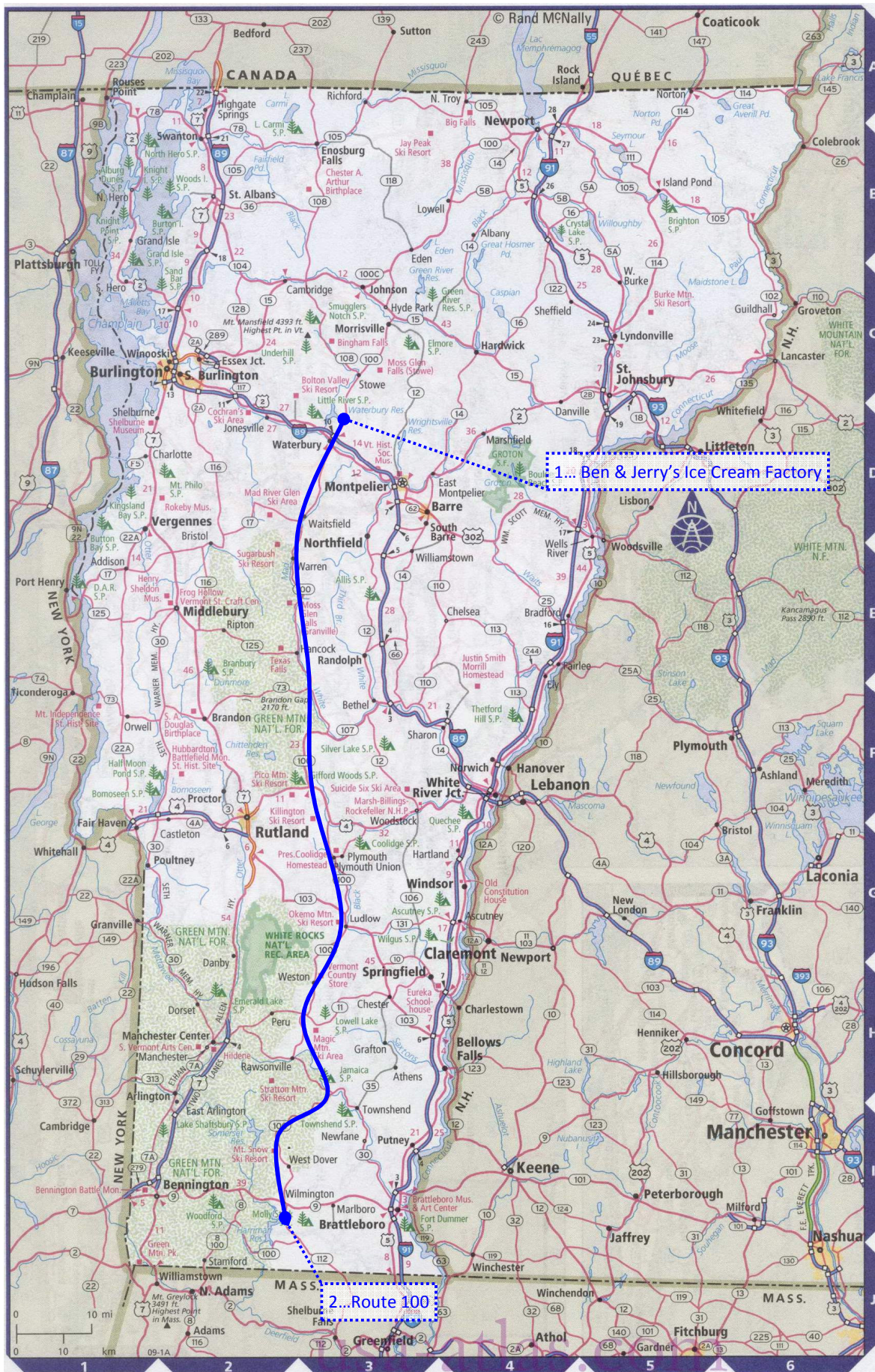
One of New England's great walks, Newport's Cliff Walk was named one of "50 Places of a Lifetime" by National Geographic Traveler magazine. Following Newport's spectacular Atlantic coastline, this 3.5-mile walk passes the grand Newport mansions, offering visitors unusual wildflowers, birds, and geology along the way. A National Recreation Trail in a National Historic District, the Cliff Walk is easy walking for most of its length, though the last third is a more challenging walk over the natural and rugged New England rocky shoreline. For a special lunch, stop at The Spiced Pear Restaurant at The Chanler at Cliff Walk, a beautiful hotel at the walk's starting point.
